### Causes of Homelessness in Livermore

In 2014, Mayor Marchand hosted a homelessness summit with the public, local leaders and service providers.

Need for additional information resulted in a comprehensive survey, in 2015.

### Reported causes noted in survey:

- 33% Lost Job
- 23% Divorce/Separation
- 18% Alcohol/Substance Abuse
- 13% Illness/Medical/Mental Health
- 12% Family/Domestic Violence





### Number of Homeless in Livermore

- Steady increase in homelessness and resource need in subsequent years
- Alameda County, 2017 Point-in-Time Count:
  - 243 individuals in Livermore were homeless
  - 102 individuals are sheltered
  - 141 individuals are unsheltered





# Livermore Valley Joint Unified School District

# LVJUSD currently has a count of 137 vulnerable students of which:

83 live in over crowded/doubled up housing

32 live in temporary shelters

20 live in hotel/motels

2 are unsheltered



#### Strategies to address LVJUSD vulnerable/homeless families:

- Work with LVJUSD administrators, teachers, social workers to identify homeless families
- Work with service providers to assist with available resources and support services



# Segments of Homelessness

Homelessness has varying segments and sub-populations that require a tailored approach.





### Segments:

- Families
- Veterans
- Youth
- Seniors
- Working poor
- Mental/physical health barriers
- Domestic Violence
- · Housing insecurity
- Bad credit/eviction
- Alcohol/substance abuse



# **Homeless Service Categories**

- Housing Navigation/Case Management
- Homeless Prevention
- Temporary/Transitional/Emergency Shelter
- Safety Net Services (Housing, Health, Safety and Food)
- Basic Needs (Bathrooms, Showers and Laundry)
- · Outreach/Resource Referrals
- Health and Sanitation Services



# Livermore Housing First Strategy

The City Council recognized homelessness as a priority and committed local funds and dedicated staff to develop and implement strategies that address the growing number of homeless families and individuals.



Identified strategies:

- A need to create, acquire and secure new permanent supportive units targeted for the unsheltered homeless population
- A focus on veterans, families with children, chronically homeless with disabilities



### **Homeless Housing Strategy**

- 9 new housing projects in the pipeline
- 437 new affordable rental units
- Estimated 61 units for homeless
- Deeply affordable = 30% of Area Median Income (AMI) or rent that shall not exceed 30% of the annual income

**Shepherd's Gate-** residential program for women and children


<u>Arukah House-</u> transitional housing for men recently released from prison and/or are homeless

<u>Cornerstone Fellowship-</u> serves hot breakfast, showers and clothing for the homeless on the Vineyard Fellowship Church grounds Monday mornings

<u>Asbury United Methodist Church-</u> provides hot meals, showers and laundry facilities 3 days a week

<u>Livermore Homeless Refuge-</u>provides 25 beds in rotating warming station shelters





### Homeless Taskforce









- Development of strategies to improve or enhance supportive services
- · Welfare checks on the most at risk individuals
- Review of data captured from online portal
- Promotes and maintains a strong and congruent working group



# City of Livermore Police Department Homeless Liaison & Policing Team

- · Two full time officers
- · Engage homeless community
- Work closely with homeless providers, District Attorneys office, Zone 7, Caltrans, LARPD
- Visit other jurisdictions to assess outreach and program models
- · Coordinate appropriate encampment clean ups

County of Alameda Continuum of Care

Coordinated Entry System (CES)

Ending Homelessness in Alameda County

- HUD requires that County Continuum of Care implement CES as the intake assessment process, to house the most vulnerable through a fair and consistent prioritization method
- CES coordinates housing resource centers or housing hubs through a database that matches people, factoring in geographic location, housing barriers, and other influences



### Local Approach

The City of Livermore Council implemented a Subcommittee on homelessness to develop a strategic framework.

- Short-Term: Address and manage immediate priorities related to basic needs, health and safety, while developing a sustainable model.
- **Medium Term:** Address the increase in homelessness and options for transitional/ temporary housing.
- Long Term: Build dedicated permanent affordable housing for homeless with wrap around support services and long-term sustainability.

# Homeless Emergency Aid Program Funds (HEAP)

- Alameda County received HEAP funds from the State of California, Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC) under Senate Bill 850
- · One time funds to address immediate homelessness challenge
- Must be expended by March 31, 2021
- · Each City must provide a 30% funding match
- Eligible use for services: Rental assistance or subsidies and Capital Improvements
