

Imagine Livermore's Future

The City of Livermore is updating its General Plan – the plan that guides city decisions about transportation, jobs, housing, parks, shopping, services, and more. The comprehensive General Plan Update offers the community a chance to explore different possible futures for how and where to plan for a variety of land uses and developments over the next 25 years. Developing the land use alternatives continues through 2022 and includes many opportunities to share your ideas and provide your input.

THE PROCESS INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING STEPS:

- Choose focus areas that are most likely to experience change over the next 25 years.
- Create land use alternatives for each focus area.
- Evaluate and compare alternatives.
- Create a preferred scenario by mixing pieces of the alternatives and/or adding new ideas.
- Refine the preferred scenario to become the updated General Plan Land Use map that will regulate what can be built where and at what intensity.
- Further analyze the General Plan Land Use map through the General Plan Environmental Impact Report.


Drought Update:

How Much Has Livermore Conserved

Last July, the Tri-Valley's water agencies began

asking their customers to reduce their water use by 15% compared to 2020. From July 2021 to January 2022, Cal Water customers collectively cut their water use by 13% and Livermore Municipal Water customers reduced their water use by 12%. Though Livermore did not meet its 15% water conservation goal, our residents and businesses conserved well above California's statewide average. As we head into the hot summer months, it's important to remember that most homes use more than half of their water on outdoor landscaping. Now is the perfect time to transition your yard from lawn to drought-tolerant plants to permanently lower your household's water use. Further, the City of Livermore, City of Pleasanton, and Dublin San Ramon Services District (DSRSD) anticipate opening a recycled water fill station on Gleason Drive in Dublin in June. This joint project will provide recycled water for Tri-Valley residents to use for outdoor irrigation. More information will be posted on the City's website over the next few months.


